Janet Nudelman

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Janet Nudelman is the Senior Director of Program and Policy at Breast Cancer Prevention Partners (BCPP) and leads BCPP's Campaign for Safe Cosmetics. With over 30 years of experience in social change, political organizing, and women's health advocacy, Janet is a nationally recognized leader in driving cosmetic safety reform and corporate accountability in the beauty industry. At BCPP, she develops and oversees cutting-edge policy initiatives and market-based campaigns aimed at eliminating toxic chemicals linked to breast cancer and other health harms. Under her leadership, the Campaign for Safe Cosmetics has educated and mobilized millions of consumers, pressuring the \$100 billion cosmetics industry to adopt stronger regulations, increase ingredient transparency, and make safer products available for all. Previously, she served as Political Director at Credo Mobile (formerly Working Assets) and as a Legislative Assistant to Congresswoman Louise Slaughter (D-NY), a longtime champion of women's health. Janet holds a Master's degree in Public Policy from George Washington University.

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Tiah Tomlin-Harris is a nationally recognized advocate, women's health educator, and cancer coach dedicated to empowering women impacted by breast cancer, particularly Black women, who face disproportionately high risks. After her diagnosis with an aggressive form of breast cancer, she co-founded My Style Matters, Inc., a 501(c)(3) non-profit focused on improving health outcomes and overall wellbeing for women disproportionately impacted by breast cancer through holistic wellness, education, support, and advocacy.

Tiah's advocacy spans from grassroots community initiatives to Capitol Hill, where she champions health policies aimed at improving the lives of cancer patients and promoting better health outcomes. Tiah serves as a Community Board Member with Bench to Community, a Coalition member of the Beauty Justice and Black Beauty Justice Coalitions, a Breast Cancer Steering Committee member at Pfizer, a Patient Advocate for SAMBAI research, and a Project Lead graduate of the National Breast Cancer Coalition. She is also a co-author of several health-related research publications.

Tiah has been featured on local and national platforms such as Business Insider, Good Morning America 3, Fox 5 News, and The Portia Show and have spoken at numerous conferences to include the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO), American Association of Clinical Research (AACR) and the San Antonio Breast Cancer Symposium (SABCS). Her dedication has earned her awards including the Black Beauty Justice Trailblazer award, President George Bush Point of Light Award, Presidential Lifetime Achievement Award and the Georgia Secretary of State Outstanding Georgia Citizen Award.

Through her work, Tiah brings H.O.P.E.—Helping Others through Purpose, Prevention Education and Empowerment—by inspiring action and advocating for equitable healthcare and supportive communities for women facing breast cancer.



Jasmine McDonald
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Dr. McDonald is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Epidemiology at the Mailman School of Public Health at Columbia University. She has a PhD from the Biological Sciences in Public Health Program at Harvard University (Immunology and Infectious Disease, 2009), and postdoctoral training in breast cancer epidemiology from the University of Pennsylvania and Columbia University. Her research portfolio integrates individual level factors (e.g., health behaviors) and the macroenvironment (e.g. physical, social, microbial environment) with biology (e.g. endocrine disruption, epigenetic modification) to inform how these multiple levels of etiology impact breast cancer risk across the lifecourse. She looks particularly at populations that have a higher burden of cancer including those with a genetic predisposition, racial and ethnic minorities, and young women. Winner of the Presidential Teaching Award in 2021. Member of Science Advisory Panel and Board of Directors of Breast Cancer Prevention Partners (BCPP).
