

Calling All Nurses: Protect Your Patients – Be a Voice for Safer IVs

Did you know?

70% of IV bags contain DEHP - a toxic chemical linked to serious health impacts, including:

• Breast, liver, colorectal, and ovarian cancers

- Hormone disruption
- Birth defects
- Drug resistance and treatment interference
- Neurodevelopmental concerns
- Increased breast cancer relapse and mortality

Take ACTION now

Safer alternatives already exist, and hospitals can make the switch!

- 1. Find out who makes purchasing decisions in your hospital (tip: Most hospitals have a procurement or purchasing department).
- 2. Share your concerns about the danger of DEHP exposures to patients and providers.
- 3. Urge your hospital to sign the Toxic-Free IVs Hospital Pledge to switch or recommit to safer IVs



DEHP migrates directly into IV fluids, putting patients and healthcare providers at risk.
